4. If any of these are NO, put the book back on the shelf in the right place, and try another one. You have plenty of time to find books that suit you.


Ask your friends, teacher or Librarians for recommendations. Share what you have enjoyed reading - talking with friends about what they have read is a fantastic way to find more great books to read.

















REVIEWS

Draw me a hero by N.K. Ashworth Review by Whaea Rachel

This compact young adult story was a finalist in the New Zealand Book Awards for Children & Young Adults last year.

It is set in Auckland and the locations are easily recognisable. It touches on loss, self image issues and single parenting while surrounding the characters with creativity and exploration.

The story does finish with a happy ever after ending which drops the realism factor, but overall 'Draw me a Hero' was a lovely read.


Spider-Man No Way Home Recommended by Dawood, Rm #25

Pysanka Eggs

A pysanka (Ukrainian: писанка, plural: pysanky) is a Ukrainian Easter egg, decorated with traditional Ukrainian folk designs using a wax-resist method. The word pysanka comes from the verb pysaty, "to write" or "to inscribe," as the designs are not painted on, but written (inscribed) with beeswax.
