
Reading is something you can do for yourself. And it starts by choosing something you will like to read, because practising your reading doesn't need to be a chore, it should be enjoyable.



What is your goal for reading this term? How many books are you going to read?



Aidan disappears and his younger brother Lucas, their family and the community searches for days before Aidan reappears just as mysteriously. Aidan's story of where he went challenges the family and Lucas has to make it all work out in his own head.

The story is told from Lucas's point of view. It navigates the ideas of truth and faith, and believing the story that is told to you in confidence.

The story also looks at the consequences of difficult truths in the community and how it impacts relationships and friendships.

It sounds like a really deep story, but it was a lovely read by one of my favourite young adult authors. It is a sort of mystery - fantasy story while being firmly set in everyday reality. Lucas is an intermediate school aged narrator, he has a warm relationship with his brother. And family is an important theme in the story.




